

## INVOLUNTARY SERVITUDE = SLAVERY

WHAT: Prop 6 removes involuntary servitude from the California State Constitution.
WHEN TO VOTE: November 5, 2024 - General Election

Californians can vote this November on whether slavery (involuntary servitude) should remain a part of the State of California's Constitution.

A YES vote removes "slavery and involuntary servitude" from Article 1, Section 6, of the CA Constitution, which states: "Slavery and involuntary servitude are prohibited, except as a punishment for a crime"

## **BASIC FACTS ABOUT SLAVERY (INVOLUNTARY SERVITUDE) IN CALIFORNIA:**

- Incarcerated people endure relentless labor without any respite, devoid of any time off. Failure to report to work results in severe consequences, such as the denial of contact visiting with their family, children, or loved ones, denial of phone calls, solitary confinement, relocation to volatile environments, and even extensions to their sentences.
- Incarcerated people also have no choice in scheduling work around educational or therapeutic programs or choosing work that would develop transferable skills for the jobs they're interested in after release.
- Upon entering prison, every incarcerated individual is required to undertake designated work assignments, devoid of any choice in job type or work schedules. Incarcerated people face repercussions should they decline such assignments, even when they are unwell, injured, or lack the necessary safety equipment for the given task.
- Reflect for a moment: Can you fathom the distress of having your employer deny your fundamental human rights in a similar manner?
